

#### In Memoriam

Paul Statia



Grey County Master Gardeners lost one of its founding members with the death of Paul Statia on April 13, at the age of 79.

Paul was born in Orangeville, moving as a youngster to Wroxeter, a small town in Huron County where he spent the rest of his life. He married his childhood

sweetheart, Joyce, in 1966, and was the proud father of four children, grandfather of six, and great grandfather of two at last count.

Paul started his 33 year career in education in 1964 as a teacher in a one room schoolhouse. Talk about a one man band – he even had to act as the school bus driver on occasion! In 1968 he moved from the classroom to the principal's office with the Huron County Board of Education, filling that position in three area schools until he retired in 1997. During the early years of his career he spent what little free time he had available studying, and received his Master of Education degree from the University of Ottawa.

Don't think that Paul put his feet up after he retired. With a group of dedicated gardeners from Bruce, Grey and Huron counties he helped establish the Tri-county Master Gardeners, now the Grey County group. As a Master Gardener, and later a Master Gardener Emeritus, Paul generously shared his time and knowledge with the community as well as with other members of the group.

Paul believed strongly in community service and was a charter member of the Howick Optimist Club as well as

part of the building and finance committees for the Howick Community Centre. A classic car enthusiast, we never knew what fancy set of wheels would transport him to our meetings. Come the fall, however, he and Joyce would head south to winter in the warmth of Brownsville, Texas.

Dedicated to education to the end, Paul was part of the body bequeathal program at Western University, to provide learning opportunities even after his death.

Special Interest: Community Gardens

After she spent a transformative season on a permaculture farm in France in 2012, gardening became an integral part of her life. The following summer, she joined her first community garden in Cambridge, ON. Since then, she has been both a gardener and planning team member with numerous community gardens, as well as cultivating her own property with a small fruit orchard, an annual vegetable garden, and perennial beds. Danielle is an avid learner and has been enjoying the MG community immensely.

Along with her roles in community gardens, Danielle is involved with the YOTG (Year of the Garden Group) and the popular Minute with a Master Gardener on FB.

#### **Judy Brisson**

Special Interest: Native Plants

Judy joined MGs in 2004 and is the secretary for the group, along with her roles in other plant organizations. Judy is our go to for native plant ID and information.

Judy says:

I have been gardening with native plants since about 1990. My goal is to evoke various habitats of the Canadian landscape and attract the insects, birds and animals associated with them, while minimizing the use of supplemental water and chemicals. I have an "ecological" garden – beds are arranged not by colour or as a single species mass planting but as mini habitats with plants that would naturally grow together in nature. The yard provides wildlife habitat including food, water and shelter. Dead wood is left standing, brush piles provide shelter and plants provide food for mammals, birds, butterflies and pollinating insects. Mammals that visit include raccoon, porcupine, weasel, opossum, muskrat and four species of squirrel. Many of the native plants I grow are difficult to find as plants and I actively grow native plants from seed.

The journey to native plants has been long and interesting. I learned from courses, books and experimentation. I am thrilled that what was once a fringe movement is now mainstream with native plants readily available in garden centres.

I have been active with Guelph Wellington Master Gardeners, The Waterloo Wellington Wildflower Society (now Nature Guelph Wildflower Society) and am a member of the North American Native Plant Society. I love to share my passion for native plants and have done presentations, lead tours, lead seed workshops, and shared my garden on tours. And of course, I share my



plants at the Nature Guelph and the GWMGs plant sales and at plant exchanges.

Pistil = the female part of the flower - "pistil packin' mama"


SOS = Style, Ovary, Stigma (the parts of the pistil)




#### **Job Description - Vice President**

- Supports and works closely with the President to assist with his or her duties, especially regarding governance

- Reviews information submitted in Annual Reviews and in the Annual Report in order to recognize achievements, share best practices, and identify potential areas of concern

#### Reminder – Stopping the Spread of Invasive Jumping Worms in Ontario

Master Gardeners need to be ready with information, strategies and resources to support home gardeners and horticultural societies. Although Jumping Worms (JWs) are a major threat, we need to focus on what can be done and not let fear or their presence overwhelm us. Let's do our part to limit their spread, support research, and encourage gardeners to enjoy their gardens. Have JW materials and a poster and ID guide printed out to share information at advice clinics and plant sales. Include JW information as a public service message at the end of your garden presentations or on social media. (See resources at end of this article.)

#### **Explain the Problem**

As you know, JWs were confirmed in Windsor-Essex in 2014, and Dundas, Toronto and Wheatley in 2021. JWs cause much more damage and spread much more quickly than other earthworms. They can kill plants by stripping the soil of nutrients, leaving behind bare, dry granular pellets that look like coffee grounds. They threaten our gardens and lawns, farms and forests, as well as bird and animal life. There are currently no controls or pesticides to stop JWs.

#### Become Familiar with the JW Life Cycle & ID

JWs die in winter and hatch from eggs in spring from cocoons the size of a poppy seed. They begin to hatch when soil temperatures reach 10°C/50°F and continue to hatch throughout the summer. From May to June, JWs are tiny. If you find a large worm in the spring, it won't be a JW. Plants, mulch, soil and compost sold in spring may contain JWs but not show evidence of JWs. When they mature (July to October) they develop a **light band** (clitellum) near their head. The band is smooth (you can't feel it) and goes all around the worm. Other earthworms have a raised saddled-shaped band. Late summer is the best time to detect JWs and tell them apart from other earthworms. They are found near the top of the soil and often in large groups and **thrash wildly** from side to side when disturbed. If agitated, JWs can **drop their tail**. No other earthworms have these three features.

#### **Focus on Prevention**

People spread JWs without realizing it. JW egg cases (cocoons) can be in soil, mulch, plants, landscaping equipment and in even the treads of shoes and tires. One cocoon or worm is enough to infest a garden.

#### What Gardeners Can Do to Stop the Spread

Bait: Never use JWs for bait. Fish don't like them and they don't stay on a hook. Dispose of all unused bait in the garbage, never on natural lands.

#### **Arrive Clean / Leave Clean**

Clean footwear before and after visiting any private or public garden, or natural area.

#### **Ask Questions**

Ask nurseries, landscaping companies and soil, compost and mulch providers how they are controlling JWs. If they know nothing about JWs, then be concerned and offer to share information with them.

#### **Inspect New Soil**

Check new mulch, compost, and soil for JWs.

#### **New Plants**

Inspect the soil and roots before planting new plants in your garden. Be aware that in spring, worms will be tiny and impossible to identify. Choose bare-root plants or grow plants from seeds when possible. If you get a plant before July, you may want to keep the plant in its pot until JWs can be more easily identified.

Quarantine new plants by placing them in a container (e.g., sturdy plastic bag, pot, tub) that prevents worms from escaping or cocoons from washing away.

#### Safe Disposal

Kill suspected JWs by freezing, leaving in a bag out in the sun, or soaking in vinegar or rubbing alcohol. Ensure they are dead before discarding in the garbage.

#### **Infested Soil**

Soil can be placed in sealed plastic bags and left in the sun to solarize. Temperatures need to reach a minimum of 40°C for at least 3 days, before being safe to reuse in the garden.

#### **Support Research by Reporting JWs**

**Details:** GEMG held their 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Online Native Plants & Heirloom Vegetables Sale this month. Members grew heirloom vegetables from seed which were sold along with a variety of native plants. Our sale was very successful...surpassing last year's sales and interest by many gardeners and local horticultural groups. #### **Stratford and Area Master Gardeners**

#### Name: ReLeaf Stratford – May Update

**Details:** There is a growing awareness in Stratford and across Ontario about our disappearing native bird and animal species due to loss of habitat. Native plants support native insect populations which are vital for providing food for birds and animals; without them we are faced with empty and silent landscapes. However, local people are coming together to reverse this frightening trend. SAMG are spearheading a project to help restore native habitat.

Called ReLeaf Stratford, MGs have teamed up with other local groups to plant 2,022 native trees and shrubs in Stratford in 2022, the Year of the Garden. SAMG held a very successful ReLeaf Stratford event the last weekend in April selling upwards of 600 native trees and shrubs as part of the group's ongoing efforts to improve the city's tree canopy. Perth County is predominantly farmland and has the second lowest tree cover in Ontario, sitting at about 10 per cent, well below the threshold recommended to maintain significant biodiversity.

This was the first sale the group has hosted, offering local residents an opportunity to purchase native species. elderberry, New Jersey tea and bush honeysuckle were just a few of the pollinator friendly species sold to provide additional habitat for birds, animals and insects. #### Name: Creating Nature Inspired Gardens

**Details:** SAMG and Stratford Public Library concluded their well attended and acclaimed Creating Nature Inspired Gardens Series with an informative lecture by Dr. Victoria MacPhail on Native Plants for Pollination -Linking Plants and Pollinators together in Your Garden. Participants learned about pollinator basics, focussing on the importance of pollinators, an overview of pollinator decline, and how to reduce further decline by creating pollinator friendly gardens. Gardens can include window boxes, flower beds, garden plots, commercial grounds and landfills. #### **Topics**

#### Soil Health – Understanding, Maintaining and Sustaining

**Instructor:** Darrell Bley, Instructor / Curator of Woody Plants, Niagara Parks Botanical Gardens and School of Horticulture

This workshop will focus on reviewing the targeted and key physical, chemical, and biotic properties of a healthy soil. Since many of us in our home gardens may not have the perfect "utopia" of garden soils, we will explore and discuss ways to alter the physical and chemical properties of soils. When these two components are in good balance the most important component for healthy soils, the biotic living world, come in and set up shop in this more perfect home. What we need to do is sustain that home and give the biota all the creature comforts to encourage their growth in populations. This in turn provides the circle of life in which our plants are a part. We in turn reap the benefits of a healthy and happy garden.

We will also spend some time reviewing soil lab results and understanding how to interpret the numbers and results. Important tools, references, microscopes, and stereoscopes will be used to assist us in our quest for understanding and maintaining a healthy soil.

We will need to bring soil samples taken 6 inches deep from various parts of the garden and mixed in a bag, as we will be doing lab work related to texture, pH, electroconductivity, and soil biota.

#### 2. What's Bugging My Trees and Shrubs?

#### **Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) Seeds Alert**

Canadians are encouraged to connect with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) before sending seeds abroad.

As Canada's plant health regulator, the CFIA plays an important role in making sure seeds from Canada meet internationally agreed upon regulations. Over the past year, the CFIA has seen an increasing number of notifications of non-compliance from foreign countries about seeds exported from Canada without proper phytosanitary (plant health) certification. Seeds can potentially be invasive in some countries or spread plant diseases or other pests. That's why it's important to check requirements with the CFIA. Not meeting requirements has consequences. For example, the destination country may destroy the seeds and issue Canada a notice of non-compliance. All seeds, including those in small packets for gardeners, must comply with the import requirements of the destination country.

Please share this information with the Canadian public to increase awareness of the important steps to take when shipping or exporting seeds to protect international plant resources, our economy and the environment. The timing is appropriate now as people start to think about spring gardening and with the United Nations' recent declaration that May 12 will be International Day of Plant Health. The CFIA has spokespeople available for interviews, people who are experts in plant health imports and exports. Our experts are also willing to write and submit a piece if that is of interest.

#### Annex 1

#### **MGOI Corporate Secretary Job Description**

#### <u>Authority</u>

The Corporate Secretary position of a non-profit organization plays a critical role in fostering communication and diligence through proper management and utilization of important records such as meeting minutes and the organization's bylaws.

The Corporate Secretary position has wide-ranging responsibilities, requiring more than simply being present at all board meetings. The Corporate Secretary should be knowledgeable about the organization's records and related materials, providing advice and resources to the board on topics such as governance issues, amendments to provincial laws, and the like, that will assist them in fulfilling their fiduciary duties. The Corporate Secretary's address is the corporate address of Master Gardeners of Ontario Inc. as there is no physical address.

As the custodian of the organization's records, the Corporate Secretary is responsible for maintaining accurate documentation and meeting any legal requirements such as annual filing deadlines. The Corporate Secretary is responsible for reviewing and updating documents as necessary and ensuring all documents are safely stored and readily accessible.

#### Requirements

Organizations are required by law to maintain specific records for several purposes, including:

- accurate recollection of decisions
- determination of eligibility to vote
- continuity of policies and practices
- accountability of directors and officers.

The Corporate Secretary is responsible for ensuring that accurate and sufficient documentation exists to meet legal requirements, and to enable authorized persons to determine when, how, and by whom the board's business was conducted. In order to fulfill these responsibilities, and subject to the organization's bylaws, the Corporate Secretary ensures the accuracy and availability of meeting minutes, proposes policies and practices, submits various reports to the Board, fulfills any other requirements of a Director and Officer, and performs other duties as the need arises and/or as defined in the bylaws.

#### Accountability

The Corporate Secretary is accountable to the Board of Directors (if elected or appointed by them) as specified in the bylaws. Through the Board of Directors, certain duties of the Corporate Secretary may be delegated to the Executive Director, Board members and/or committees as appropriate; however, the accountability for them remains with the Corporate Secretary.

#### Minutes

The Corporate Secretary takes and reviews for accuracy the minutes of meetings, including the Annual General Meeting. Requirements of minutes should include at a minimum:

- date, time, location of meeting
- list of those Directors present and absent
- indication of the presence of a quorum
- list of items discussed
- list of reports presented
- text of motions presented and description of their disposition

#### Custodian of records

The Corporate Secretary ensures that the records of the organization are maintained as required by law and made available when required by authorized persons. These records may include founding documents, (e.g. letters patent, articles of incorporation), lists of Directors, Board and Committee meeting minutes financial reports, and other official records.

#### Membership Records

The Corporate Secretary ensures through review, that official records are maintained of members of the organization and Board and ensures that these records are available when required for reports, elections, referenda, other votes, etc.

#### **Bylaws**

The Corporate Secretary ensures that an up-to-date copy of the bylaws is available at all meetings.

#### <u>Communication</u>

The Corporate Secretary ensures that proper notification is given of directors' and members' meetings as specified in the bylaws.

#### Meetings

The Corporate Secretary participates in Board meetings as a voting member. In the absence of the President (and Vice-President), the Corporate Secretary calls the meeting to order, presiding until a temporary chairperson is elected.

#### Signing Officer

The Corporate Secretary may be designated by the Board of Directors and/or bylaws as one of the signing officers for certain documents. In this capacity, the Corporate Secretary may be authorized or required to sign or countersign cheques, correspondence, applications, reports, contracts or other documents on behalf of organization.

#### Filing of Documents

The Corporate Secretary is the registered agent with respect to the laws of the jurisdiction: the person upon whom legal notice to the corporation is served, and responsible for ensuring that documents necessary to maintain the corporation are filed.
