Elizabeth Brims can lay claim to the unusual accomplishment of becoming a certified Master Gardener not once, but twice.

She first joined Lake Simcoe South Master Gardeners in late 2004, while living in Aurora with her husband

Drew and their three children. She completed the educational requirements in a speedy 19 months – this, when course materials and assignments had to be sent back and forth by mail. An active member from the start, Elizabeth took on leadership roles, including a stint as secretary. She obtained her MG Certificate in the spring of 2006.

Like so many of us, Elizabeth's passion for gardening was inspired by her mother, who taught her that with good soil, patience and love almost everything will blossom. She poured that enthusiasm into the gardens around her home – veggies, perennials, shrubs and trees – and firmly believes that there is always room for one more plant in every garden. (She's so right!)

But in 2010, the growing demands of work and family led her to resign her membership. Looking at her challenging career, you can understand why. Over 25 plus years, Elizabeth held a variety of senior management roles in human services, with a focus on poverty reduction, food insecurity and homelessness. Career highlights included acting as project manager to open <u>Belinda's Place</u>, York Region's first emergency housing facility for women, and leading the implementation of a person-centred delivery model for Ontario Works.



In 2019, a new job as manager of Ontario Works for Grey County prompted a move to Meaford, on Georgian Bay. Her new home has very little property for gardening, so Elizabeth (being Elizabeth!) is finding other ways to get her hands in the dirt. In 2021, she joined the <u>David Suzuki</u> <u>Foundation's Butterflyway</u> project as a Ranger, and cofounded the grassroots organization "<u>Pollinate Blue</u> <u>Mountains</u>" to raise public awareness of native pollinator plants and create public and private pollinator gardens across the community.

That same year, Elizabeth joined Grey County Master Gardeners as a MGiT – and in addition to taking on presentations, advice clinics and anything that needed doing Elizabeth applied her considerable organizational skills to getting all our assets in order. A Herculean task! Now retired, she has yet another leadership role in the group; in addition to assets coordinator, Elizabeth is now vice-coordinator.

Susan Cox

A quick walk around the farmhouse that Susan Cox shares with her husband, Peter Huggins, and you know you're at the home of gardeners. They bought the 100-acre farm – with views for days – between Wiarton and Owen Sound fourteen years ago, moving into it full time in 2015.



Over those years, they've created a little paradise with a variety of perennial gardens, native plants, a veggie plot, strawberries, fruit and nut trees and a chock-full herb garden beside a small greenhouse. ("Building it was like putting together a 10,000 piece Lego set," she says.)

Susan is a knowledgeable and amiable tour guide, full of stories about each of the plants, what's doing well, what isn't, and what needs to be moved to a happier spot. A gardener's gardener.

Born and raised in Toronto, Susan credits her grandmother for passing on the gardening DNA, something she started exploring in her twenties after acquiring her first home in Waterloo. Husband Peter came from England, so every couple of years they'd make the pilgrimage back, always including visits to many of the beautiful gardens there, including the biggies Sissinghurst and Westonbirt. That led to an interest in design, as well as plants, fed by a constant diet of Fine Gardening and Harrowsmith magazines. (She still has every Harrowsmith published from the mid-seventies on!)

Susan spent her career with Corrections Canada, working for many years on the front line as a parole and probation officer; then, for the last fifteen, putting that knowledge to work on the corporate side, developing rehabilitation programs, writing training materials and training staff.

By 2020 she was mostly retired, doing consultancy work, when the pandemic hit. She had been looking for volunteer opportunities, but wanted to stay away from the social services world she came from. Master Gardeners, with its focus on science-based horticultural information for the home gardener, offered an opportunity to use both her passion for gardening and a well-honed skill set.

She signed up with GCMGs in the winter of 2021 and jumped in with both feet, taking on the challenging role of secretary as well as presenting a number of Zoom presentations. After the world opened up a bit, she hit the road with her 2001 Volvo Station wagon. She figures she delivered 12 presentations last year, along with creating new ones and refreshing others.

Her final course done and dusted, Susan received her certification as a Master Gardener this spring. This November, Susan resigned as secretary of GCMGs to take on a new role – Group Co-ordinator.

Name: Growing Vegetables in Collingwood

Details: In the October newsletter we highlighted a season-long growing vegetables course that Simcoe County MG Marianne Lepa ran at a community garden space in Collingwood in the summer. Ten students enthusiastically participated in the educational program and learned the basics of vegetable gardening.

Algoma Master Gardeners

Name: Algoma Lost Apple Project

Details: A very successful fruit tree grafting workshop with Phil Beauchamp of Beautiful Fields Farm and Nursery was run in late March. What was to be a single workshop grew to be 3 due to the demand from the public.

Phil is an amazing instructor and everyone was thrilled with the workshops. Attendees got rootstock to plant in their supplied pot and medium. Onto that they were guided by Phil to graft on scions from some of his apple trees. So far, it would appear that there was a 95% success rate with these grafts!

Stratford Master Gardeners

Name: Donald McTavish Conservation Fund

In July Dr. Brian Husband and Paul Kron of the University of Guelph Ontario Heritage and Feral Apple Project, along with three of their students, spent three days touring old orchards on St. Joseph Island, the North Shore of Lake Huron and Manitoulin Island collecting samples all along the way. They were able to see for themselves many of the trees we have sampled in the previous three years. These samples have been DNA tested by Paul and students.

Properties toured included the original site of the David Tait Nursery on St. Joseph Island and the farm where Tait and his brothers grew up and where a lot of the stock for the nursery was grown over on the North shore.

Name: Algoma Seedy Saturdays

Details: Representatives from Seedy Saturday Sault Ste. Marie, Central Algoma Seedy Saturday, Sustain Algoma, and members of our little group womanned a table every Saturday morning at the Algoma Farmers' Market from May through Thanksgiving. We promoted Master Gardeners and educated the public by answering their gardening questions.

Members also helped to plant and maintain the beds at the Pollinator Garden at the Farmers' Market. This is a garden that draws a lot of attention from shoppers, especially the young ones, as well as from Pollinators. **Details:** Stratford and Area Master Gardeners and ReLeaf Stratford volunteers began the installation of a native plant garden at the Emergency entrance to Stratford General Hospital. The first phase included planting a white swamp oak (*Quercus bicolor*) with 5 bush honeysuckles (*Diervilla lonicera*) and 4 sumac shrubs (*Rhus* spp.) planted around it.

This project was made possible due to funding from a Community Foundation grant, courtesy of the Donald McTavish Conservation Fund. Master Gardeners will complete the project next spring by adding native perennials.

The Community Foundation grant also allowed Stratford Master Gardeners to plant a native red oak (*Quercus rubra*) at Optimism Place Women's Shelter in Stratford. Construction at the facility removed most of the mature trees. The staff and administration were delighted with the donation and installation of a red oak.

Dates: Mar. 12 to Apr. 30, 2024 **Details:** The ever popular Seeds to Table course is being run again for our London community. We have been running this course



for over 10 years for individuals in London who want to learn how to grow their own food from their own backyard or balcony. We provide them with the knowledge and confidence to grow their own veggies and fruit and to increase their food security.

Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) Seeds Alert

Canadians are encouraged to connect with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) before sending seeds abroad. As Canada's plant health regulator, the CFIA plays an important role in making sure seeds from Canada meet internationally agreed upon regulations. The CFIA has seen an increasing number of notifications of non-compliance from foreign countries about seeds exported from Canada without proper phytosanitary (plant health) certification. Seeds can potentially be invasive in some countries or spread plant diseases or other pests. Not meeting requirements has consequences such as the destination country destroying the seeds and issuing Canada a notice of non-compliance.

All seeds, including those in small packets for gardeners, must comply with the import requirements of the destination country.

Please share this information with the Canadian public to increase awareness of the important steps to take when shipping or exporting seeds to protect international plant resources, our economy and the environment.

The CFIA has spokespeople available for interviews, people who are experts in plant health imports and exports. CFIA experts are also willing to write and submit a piece if that is of interest. Please contact us if you have any questions. We look forward to hearing from you.




